The Peter Scott Debate is the Wildscreen Festival's prestigious keynote event, open to the public as well as festival delegates. 'Animals vs People' looks at the complex issues surrounding the twin objectives of protecting both human and biological diversity. It will consider the importance of finding ways of establishing partnerships between conservationists and local people, the problems that arise when such partnerships fail, and ask whether or not there are inherent conflicts of interest between the goals of biodiversity and cultural diversity. Valmik Thapar (India), outspoken tiger conservationist and Will Travers (UK), CEO of the Born Free Foundation, argue for the animals; Professor Bill Adams (UK), Cambridge University, and Mary Mavanza (Tanzania) of the Jane Goodall Institute argue for the people. The debate will be chaired by Dr Cristian Samper, Director of the Smithsonian Institution.

Harvard historian and broadcaster Niall Ferguson follows his best-selling books on the First World War, the American empire and the violent twentieth century with *The Ascent of Money*, a new book and Channel 4 series on money and its role in the economy, politics, the arts, war and peace. From the impact of the bond market on the American civil war to the way financial failure led to Argentina becoming a basket case to the financial

revolution now propelling China from poverty to power in a single generation, Ferguson, in his usual passionate style and with great clarity, talks about the ascent of money as the cornerstone of human progress and decline. As Britain and the world reels under the impact of the credit crunch it's an essential session for our time. Whether you are just paying the bills or want to be a master of the universe, Ferguson shows that knowing about the history of money with its bubbles and crashes, will stop you getting your fingers burnt.

This autumn Bristol is host to world renowned scientists, artists, musicians and filmmakers in a stunning series of sci-art conversations. The **Creative Brain: Conversations Between Art** and Science is co-ordinated by Stafford Lightman, a neuroscientist and Professor of Medicine, and Kathy Sykes, Professor of Sciences and Society, both at the University of Bristol. In a series of eight chaired public conversations between eminent and innovative scientists and artists, the series will seek to explore the parallel and creative landscapes that both science and art inhabit, to identify the insights that can enrich each other's work and share the value of such cross-disciplinary dialogue live, in print, and online - with the world. What have an embryologist and saxophonist got in common? Why is a Nobel Prizewinner for research into cell cycles discussing the power of art to understand the world? A Booker Prize-winning novelist exploring how brain sciences might explain love? Why has a scientist turned to the power of art to illuminate science, and what stimulates all these speakers to seek dialogue across disciplines? The Creative Brain conversations will explore the intersect between art and science where hard graft, creative approaches and the role of the human imagination are key. 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
