Condemned as junk science or pseudoscience by many scientists, intelligent design has been debated in all sectors of US society and even been the subject of court cases. In this year, celebrating the life and work of Charles Darwin, Shermer, in a wide-ranging talk, puts forward the case for evolution and against intelligent design. Expect also scepticism about many other issues. A rare opportunity to hear a leading US commentator. Chaired by Bruce Hood, University of Bristol, author of the forthcoming *SuperSense: Why We Believe the Unbelievable*.

Whether it's a child bored in class, an employee being misused, or just someone who feels frustrated but can't quite explain why, too many people don't know what they are really capable of achieving. Education, business and society as a whole are losing out. Sir Ken's new book, *The Element*, draws on the stories of a wide range of people – from ex-Beatle Paul McCartney to renowned physicist Richard Feynman and many others, including business leaders and athletes – showing how all of them came to recognise their unique talents and were able to make a successful living doing what they love.

LEONARD SUSSKIND DARWIN AND THE COSMIC LANDSCAPE

Leonard Susskind, Felix Bloch Professor of Theoretical Physics at Stanford University, comes to Bristol to talk about 'Darwin and the cosmic landscape'. In many ways the universe seems to be surprisingly well constructed for our own existence: it seems 'intelligently designed'. But cosmologists and physicists are tracing this illusion of intelligent design to principles which parallel those of Darwinian evolution. Just as there is a vast landscape of biological designs, our best theories of physics imply an equally vast landscape of universe designs. String theory provides an analogue of DNA for the universe and modern cosmology makes use of a principle of mutation that creates a tremendously large multiverse. A tiny fraction of the multiverse is suitable for life, and it is no surprise that that is where life is found.





Graham Farmelo, author of the new biography *The Strangest Man: The Hidden Life of Paul Dirac, Quantum Genius*, looks at Dirac's achievements and at how his approach to physics was crucially influenced by his education in Bristol. Dirac, the greatest scientist Britain produced in the twentieth century, was born, bred and educated in Bristol. He came from a modest home and did not at first shine brightly at school, but, by the time he was 25, he was one of the most famous physicists in the world for his work on quantum theory. By the time he was 31, he was the youngest theoretician ever to win the Nobel Prize in physics.

In his new, beautifully written, witty and illuminating book, *Darwin's Island*, Steve Jones explores Darwin's life and brings his work up to date. His talk looks back at this remarkable life and Darwinism today.

Distinguished journalist and historian, Misha Glenny, takes us on a journey through the new world of international organised crime; a shadow economy that may now account for up to 20% of the world's GDP. Glenny tells the stories of gun runners in Ukraine, money launderers in Dubai, drug syndicates in Canada, cyber criminals in Brazil, racketeers in Japan and many more. He has spoken to countless gangsters, policemen and victims of organised crime while also exploring the ferocious consumer demand for drugs, trafficked women, illegal labour and arms across five continents. A breathtaking picture of the horrifying, sometimes inspiring, usually bizarre and occasionally funny state of crime in today's world, offering profound insights into the pitfalls of globalisation where the rules dividing the legal from the illegal are often far from clear. Glenny will also argue that conventional policing methods are no longer appropriate to deal with a problem whose roots lie in global poverty and the ever widening divisions between rich and poor.
