BARBARA EHRENREICH Smile or Die: How Positive Thinking Undermines Us All

The New York Times calls Barbara Ehrenreich "our premier reporter of the underside of Capitalism". Recent books have seen her go undercover to find a job in America's corporate sector and work in low-wage America, busting the myth of the American dream. She now looks at positive thinking - formerly a marginal 19th century healing technique, which is now seen as the key to success and prosperity. Ehrenreich exposes the downside of the science of happiness which leads to self-blame, a morbid preoccupation with stamping out 'negative' thoughts and, on a national level, created an era of irrational optimism. Ehrenreich attacks conventional wisdom and faux science, and calls for clarity and courage.

STEWART BRAND AND BRIAN ENO The Future of Environmentalism

Stewart Brand is one of the great visionaries of our time. His latest book, Whole Earth Discipline, argues that the profound transformations currently underway - climate change, urbanisation and biotechnology - mean that environmentalists need to embrace science and engineering to forestall the cataclysmic deterioration of the Earth's resources. Brand shatters a number of environmental myths, arguing that cities are greener than the countryside, nuclear power is the future of energy, and genetic engineering is the key to crop and land management. He is in discussion with Brian Eno, musician and composer, cultural critic and writer who has a long-standing interest and involvement in new thinking about politics and the future.

Albie Sachs Life, Law and Nelson Mandela

Albie Sachs is a hero of our times who played a prominent part in the struggle for justice in South Africa, was tortured, and lost the use of his right arm and one eye in a car bomb attack. His experiences provoked an outpouring of creative thought on the role of law as a protector of human dignity in the modern world. Appointed by Nelson Mandela to his country's first Constitutional Court, he provides unique access to an insider's perspective on the major issues confronting modern South Africa as a fledgling democracy, tells how his extraordinary life has influenced his approach to the cases before him, and provides a rare glimpse into the working of a judicial mind.

REBECCA GOLDSTEIN AND Steven Pinker Arguments for the Existence of God

Award-winning novelist and philosopher Rebecca Goldstein's new novel, *36 Arguments for the Existence of God* – about an atheist with a soul – plunges into the great debate of our day: the clash between faith and reason. World events are being shaped by fervent believers at home and abroad, while a new atheism is asserting itself in the public sphere. On intellectual grounds, the sceptics have everything on their side. Yet people refuse to accept their seemingly irrefutable arguments and continue to embrace faith in God as their source of meaning, purpose and comfort. Goldstein



shows that the tension between religion and doubt cannot be understood through rational argument alone. It also must be explored from the point of view of individual people caught in the raptures and torments of religious experience in all their variety. Goldstein is in discussion with Steven Pinker – experimental psychologist, cognitive scientist, and author of the bestselling and award-winning *The Language Instinct, The Blank Slate* and *The Stuff of Thought*. A feast of philosophical and religious ideas is promised from a world leading philosopher and novelist and one of the great scientists of our time.
